## **About Us**

The Hope Foundation (HOPE) is a development organisation working to provide sustainable pathways out of poverty and advocate for the rights and equal treatment of vulnerable children and communities in West Bengal, India.

The power and potential of a child are often suppressed by poverty, discrimination, and violence. However, in today's world, every child should have the right to be healthy, educated, protected, and valued in their own family and society. To create long-lasting change, we empower the children, their families, and their communities to access their rights and break free of the cycle of poverty.

Since 1999, The Hope Foundation has been building a strong partnership with children, families, government departments, and civil society organisations, fighting for the rights of children. In 2024-2025, HOPE implemented 58 projects supported by 527 members of staff to achieve this mission.

OUR VISION: A world where it should never hurt to be a child: A world free from poverty, inequalities, and injustices. Ensuring every child, and adult, has the opportunity to thrive with equal opportunities, contributing to long-term local sustainability, empowerment and system strengthening.

OUR MISSION: To improve the quality of life for the most marginalised people, primarily in India. Ensuring their basic rights and enhancing their dignity of life through protection, health, education, and economic development in a sustainable life-cycle approach. Achieving these missions through fundraising activities, awareness raising, and sensitisation initiatives.

Those living with a disability are often hidden, with high levels of stigma associated with any form of disability, and therefore HOPE operates both specialised projects for those living with a disability and ensures their full participating across HOPE's programming.

**Safeguarding:** HOPE places the safety of the children, and vulnerable adults, in which it serves as paramount importance across all its programming, also heightening local and staff awareness to this crucial human right regularly.

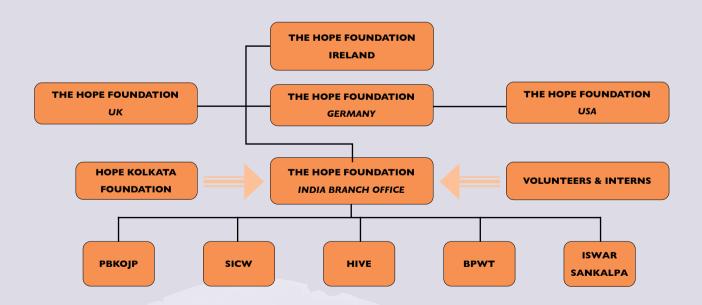

# **Implementing Partner**



#### Hope Kolkata Foundation (HKF)

Hope Kolkata Foundation was set up in 1999 to improve the lives of children living in the street-connected and slum-dwelling communities of Kolkata amid vulnerable circumstances. To ensure the protection and development of these underprivileged children, Hope Kolkata Foundation implements 4 Residential Child Care Centres, 2 Crisis Intervention Centres, a rehabilitation

centre for addicted boys, Mother & Child Care Unit, 2 Aftercare units for young adults to provide early adulthood support, Child Watch, a quality and inclusive education programme in government schools, 8 Naboasha education centres, 5 crèches, 3 resource centres for children with special needs, a mobile education centre (Education on Wheels), a Vocational Training Centre, HOPE Hospital, pharmacy, health clinic, Night Round Mobile Medical Unit, Mobile Dental Ambulance, Blindness Eradication Programme, and an Education Sponsorship Programme.

# **Our Local Partners**



## Paschim Banga Krira-o-Jana Kalyan Parishad (PBKOJP)

HOPE partnered with PBKOJP at the time of its inception in 1999 and collaborated with the organisation in various interventions such as education, vocational training and early childhood care and education. Currently, HOPE supports Prerona Residential Child Care Centre for girls, which was set up in 2003 for children in need of care and protection, including children of sex workers.

# HIVE India

#### **HIVE India**

HOPE has partnered with HIVE India since 2006 to support the Emergency Response Unit, set up to rescue any person at risk on the streets, involved in accidents, suffering from physical or mental illnesses, victimised by harassment or abuse, child labour and domestic violence.



#### Society for Indian Children's Welfare (SICW)

Since 2005, with the support of HOPE, the UMEED project worked with children with special needs to ensure their development and to reintegrate them into mainstream society. HOPE also partners with SICW to support the Education Sponsorship Programme.

#### Iswar Sankalpa (IS)

HOPE has supported the Naya Daur outreach programme since 2007, a city-wide community-based programme providing treatment and support to address the needs of homeless people with psychosocial disorders on the streets of Kolkata.



#### **Bhoruka Public Welfare Trust (BPWT)**

Snehneer Residential Child Care Centre was established in 2005 in partnership with HOPE. Snehneer ensures the holistic development of children affected and infected with HIV/AIDS through the provision of protection, healthcare, nutrition, education, and recreation in a loving and caring family environment.

## **Good Governance**

The Hope Foundation recognises our responsibility to those whom we support and to donors, sponsors and fundraisers who support us. HOPE, therefore, insists on transparent operations in all activities in Ireland, our international satellite offices, and in India. This is highlighted through HOPE's membership of Dóchas, Comhlámh (signatory with a high level of compliance to the Code of Good Practice), The Wheel, IDEA (Code signatory and compliance to) and the Consortium

for Street Children.

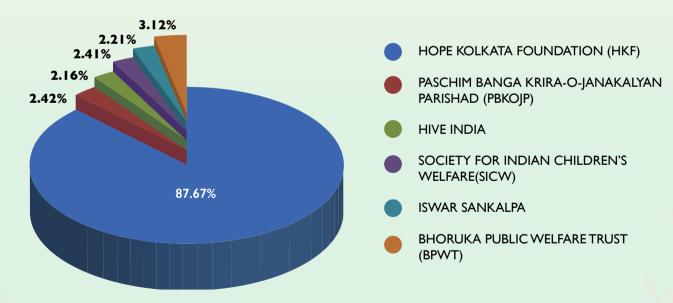
HOPE ensures that transparency and compliance with governance best practices are at the forefront of all our operations, and therefore, are fully compliant and collaborate closely with the Governance Code, Charity Regulatory Authority, Credibility Alliance, and Charities Institute Ireland (CII).

HOPE also has a Due Diligence Policy in place for its partner organisations and projects, ensuring the effective delivery of services in a transparent and accountable manner. HOPE has Triple Lock certification, which is the highest standard awarded by the Charities Institute Ireland, reflecting excellent and ethical fundraising practices, financial reporting and Governance.

# 2024-2025 Major Achievements

- 46,733 individuals across Kolkata have been direct beneficiaries of HOPE healthcare programmes and interventions in street-connected and slum communities, including over 15,819 who have been treated in Hope Hospital's Inpatient and Outpatient Departments.
- 9,078 children have received **educational support** through HOPE crèches, Naboasha centres, special education projects, educational sponsorship, and our Quality and Inclusive Education Programme.
- 1,579 children and adults have been **protected** from abuse and neglect by our Residential Child Care Programme and Child Watch.
- **880** young women and men have engaged in HOPE's **vocational training**, **skills enhancement**, and **income generation** programmes to provide sustainable pathways out of poverty.

HOPE through its programmes works towards achieving the following Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

















Throughout the year, HOPE and its partner organisations implemented a range of healthcare interventions. Services were delivered both through institutional healthcare facilities, Mobile Dental Clinic and Night Round Mobile Medical Unit, ensuring reach to even the most remote and inaccessible populations.

Access to safe and affordable medicines, regular health check-ups, and timely referrals to secondary or tertiary care formed the backbone of these initiatives.

A key pillar of HOPE's health strategy remains community awareness and participation. Awareness sessions focused on the importance of early diagnosis, treatment adherence, and preventive health measures. Communities were sensitised on issues such as hygiene, nutrition, prevention of infectious diseases like Tuberculosis and HIV/AIDS, and reducing stigma associated with mental illness and chronic conditions. These efforts played a vital role in enabling social reintegration and preventing long-term exclusion.

Hope Hospitalalso continued to extend nursing training. The Blindness Eradication Programme provided Optometric Training to young adults. Both of these initiatives promoted education and employment among the youth.

# **Hope Kolkata Foundation**

## **Hope Hospital**

Hope Hospital is committed to providing holistic healthcare to the underserved communities in and around Kolkata. HOPE Hospital's facilities include outpatient and inpatient departments, a surgery department, a diagnostic and pathological lab, dialysis, and a pharmacy. Additionally, the hospital has four outreach units: Mobile Dental Clinic, Chitpur Community Clinic, Blindness Eradication Programme, and Night Round Mobile Medical Unit, providing healthcare services to those without direct access to facilities.

Hope Hospital is grateful to all international and local donors including CSR partners for their generosity and support. Their encouragement is crucial to enable the services offered to the most vulnerable communities and individuals.

Hope Hospital has been recognised for its efforts across these fields by several esteemed bodies, including the Confederation of Indian Industry (CII). It has also been awarded the "Joyee 2024" award for two consecutive years.



#### **Impact**

- 13,564 patients received medical consultations in the outpatient department at a subsidised cost.
- 2,255 patients received secondary medical treatment, medication, and nutrition in the inpatient department.
- 928 patients underwent surgeries.
- 18,480 pathological tests were carried out.
- 1,027 dialysis sessions were conducted for 177 patients.

#### **Story of Change**

Anjali, a 5-year-old girl, comes from a rural village in Birbhum, where there is a serious lack of health care facilities. Anjali met with a serious accident, which resulted in 65% burns. Despite trying, her parents could not access a bed in a government hospital. Moreover, due to financial struggles, Anjali's parents could not afford her treatment in other hospitals. Once the family found out about HOPE Hospital, they went to Kolkata, and Anjali was admitted to HOPE Hospital. After carrying out all the necessary medical tests, she underwent plastic surgery and the required post-operative care and treatment, and made a good recovery.

## **Blindness Eradication Programme**

The Blindness Eradication Programme aims to promote eye health and eradicate preventable blindness. Community-based eye screening camps are organised throughout the year across urban slum areas of Kolkata and remote rural areas in various districts of West Bengal, in government schools, residential care centres for children and adults. Additionally, prescription glasses are also provided to those who need them. Individuals requiring advanced care are referred to the Specialised Eye Clinic at Hope Hospital. Furthermore, young adults from these communities are sponsored to become optometrists to ensure financial independence.

#### **Impact**

- 9,007 patients (3,094 children and 5,913 adults) benefited through free eye camps.
- 3,444 patients (1,441 children and 3,033 adults) benefited through specialised eye clinics.
- 446 eye surgeries were done in the Hope Hospital Eye Operation Theatre for adults and children.
- **5,810** glasses were provided.

#### Story of Change

Born into a tribal family in remote Birbhum, Parvati showed visible eye abnormalities just two months after birth. Her parents, with no access to specialised care, feared for her future. Through a local charity referral, Parvati was brought to the Eye Department at HOPE Hospital. A detailed eye check-up revealed signs of ophthalmia neonatorum and structural issues, with a suspected case of Retinopathy of Prematurity (ROP), a condition that can cause permanent blindness. Under general anaesthesia, the child underwent advanced diagnostics, including A-Scan and B-Scan imaging. ROP was ruled out after the procedures, and her condition was deemed treatable. Accordingly, she received the treatment and is now under medical supervision and follow-up visits.

## **Night Round Mobile Medical Unit**

The initiative addresses street-connected individuals, often daily wage earners who lack the time, awareness, or necessary identity documents to access government healthcare. As a result, minor ailments frequently lead to chronic conditions. The Night Round Mobile Medical Unit provides timely healthcare and medical treatment to these communities. Additionally, health awareness camps are organised. The Night Round team also serves as an emergency response unit, assisting unattended and unwell individuals found on the streets.



#### **Impact**

- 12,304 patients received primary healthcare support.
- 12,254 patients received free medicine for their treatment.
- 263 cases of wound dressings were carried out during field visits.
- **625** patients were referred to the government hospitals, whereas **134** patients were referred to Hope Hospital for secondary treatment.
- 34 community awareness sessions were conducted, among which 7 were on HIV awareness campaign, 6 on the impacts of child marriage on girls' health, and the rest on Dengue, Malaria, health, and hygiene, and against Tobacco consumption.
- 51 Hepatitis B vaccines were administered.
- 604 patients underwent diabetes monitoring.



#### **Story of Change**

Dola is a 6-year-old girl from an economically weaker family living on the streets of Kolkata. Her parents could barely ensure their daily needs, let alone afford healthcare. Tragedy struck when Dola accidentally touched an open electric wire, severely injuring her right hand. The injury led to finger contracture, leaving her unable to use her hand. Her parents were heartbroken but helpless, unable to secure treatment in either private or government hospitals.

During a routine visit, the Night Round Mobile Medical Unit identified Dola and arranged her admission to HOPE Hospital. After evaluation by a Plastic Surgeon, she underwent successful reconstructive surgery. Dola continued to recover well, regaining finger movement under close post-operative care.

## **Chitpur Community Clinic**

The Chitpur Community Clinic runs weekly in Chitpur, a slum-connected locality. It caters to the medical needs of the entire slum-connected community with special emphasis on children,

pregnant and lactating mothers, adolescent youths and older adults. Patients treated at the Clinic are also linked to primary healthcare services for appropriate immunisation and family planning.

Patients requiring further health care are referred to the Local Government hospitals and HOPE Hospital.

The Clinic also intervenes in child protection issues and conducts WHO dance movement therapy on Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights Awareness for adolescent girls of the community.



#### **Impact**

- 2,236 patients received health check-ups and medicines in 48 clinics.
- I 5 adolescent girls continued WHO approved Dance Movement Therapy.

#### Story of Change

I I-year-old Amina came to the Chitpur Clinic with severe pain and an infected wound on her right knee. Her family, unaware of the risks and lacking access to healthcare, delayed seeking treatment, and Amina's wound turned concerning. The clinic's team immediately intervened, cleaned the wound, and applied sterile dressing. She was then provided with antibiotics and painkillers, and her family was scheduled for regular follow-up visits.

Through these interventions, Amina gradually recovered, and a major health risk was avoided.

#### **Mobile Dental Clinic**

The Mobile Dental Clinic extends quality oral healthcare support to urban street-connected and slum-dwelling communities and rural areas outside Kolkata. Through a well-equipped ambulance (that operates thrice a week), several dental procedures are provided to patients. In critical cases, the patients are referred to the Specialised Dental Clinic at Hope Hospital for further evaluation.

#### **Impact**

- 6,750 people received treatment and medication for their oral health through 145 dental check-up camps conducted in different locations such as North and South 24 Parganas, Hooghly, Kolkata, Howrah, and Nadia districts in association with other NGOs and organisations through HOPE's extended community network.
- 342 extractions, I,001 scalings, 301 cavity fillings were conducted inside the dental ambulance at different camps.
- 240 outpatient clinics were conducted in Hope Hospitaland 3,652 patients were treated. 991 scalings, 531 extractions, and 740 fillings were conducted at these clinics.



#### **Story of Change**

In a remote village of Howrah, a 34-year-old woman experienced a severe toothache for over a week. With no accessible clinics and monsoon-isolated roads, she had to depend on home remedies for relief. Moreover, she had never been to a dentist before and was in the habit of brushing only once daily with a neem stick or a worn-out toothbrush. When the Mobile Dental Clinic team examined her, she had advanced dental caries with a periapical abscess (local infection) in her lower right molar. Under local anaesthesia, the decayed tooth was extracted, and she was prescribed antibiotics and painkillers. Moreover, she also received oral hygiene guidance.

## **Emergency Relief**

The Night Round Mobile Ambulance and Emergency Response Team reached out to the September 2024 flood-affected regions in Udaynarayanpur & Amta Block, Howrah. Essential dry ration, healthcare support, and tarpaulin sheets were extended to ensure the sustenance of the rural population amid the aftermath of the flood.







# Iswar Sankalpa

## Naya Daur

Naya Daur is a community-based programme that reaches out to Homeless People with Psychosocial Disabilities. The main activity of Naya Daur includes identifying homeless individuals in the areas where they stay. Once a part of Naya Daur, the homeless individuals are provided with complementary medical checkups, counselling, and other basic needs like food, clothes, and sanitary products. Those who recover substantially are then supported with livelihood opportunities. By mobilising and supporting community-based caregivers, these individuals are also supported with community-based care. In cases when the homeless person can remember the details of their native place, Naya Daur takes initiatives to help them return home.

#### **Impact**

- 139 Homeless People with Psychosocial Disabilities were supported throughout the year. 33 new clients were enrolled this year.
- 83 clients were assessed through the Life Skill Profile scale. 52 clients showed improvement, 26 remained in a static position, and 5 showed negative improvement.
- 54 clients were earning, including 12 new clients.
- 423 people were addressed through 16 awareness camps to remove social stigma.
- 5 medical camps reached out to 492 members of the community. 16 new clients were enrolled through these
  medical camps.
- 94 clients were under the care of community-based caregivers

#### **Story of Change**

Sixteen years ago, a 55-year-old man was found on the streets of Beniapukur in a severely neglected state. Diagnosed with schizophrenia, he was enrolled in Naya Daur in 2008. Through patient intervention by a social worker and active community involvement, the man slowly began to recover. A shopkeeper offered him shelter and later employed him. Regular medical support, counselling, and compassionate care helped him with self-control, social responsiveness, and proper hygiene. The community, who affectionately call him Jainul Bhaijaan, played a vital role in his recovery, inviting him to family functions and helping secure his documents and pension. In April 2025, the community took full responsibility for his care, thereby ensuring his reintegration.



# **HIVE** India

## **Emergency Response Unit**

Emergency Response Unit, equipped with ambulances, responds to any emergency call within 20 minutes. The response unit provides rescue, rehabilitation and restoration to those in crises across Kolkata and neighbouring areas. This programme also comes under the jurisdiction of the Kolkata Police. Additionally, the project aims to rescue unattended, abandoned and vulnerable women and children, accident victims, as well as persons with psychosocial disability. The response unit also extends medical and psychological support to the homeless.

#### **Impact**

- 440 people were rescued from different crises.
- 404 cases were registered with the Police, and legal guidance was provided as per the protocol for restoration, and linking with other organisations.
- 15 children were provided with legal support for rescue and restoration.
- 295 of the total rescued persons were hospitalised.
- 142 people were restored to their families.
- 38 persons with psychosocial disability were rehabilitated, and 89 other individuals were linked with different rehabilitation centres.
- 159 of the rescued people received counselling support after treatment and medication.
- **IOI** families were followed up after reunification to ensure the safety of the restored person.



#### **Story of Change**

In February 2025, the Emergency Rescue Unit received a call from Kolkata Police that Raj, aged 47 years, had been involved in an accident while crossing the road. The HIVE team immediately reached the site and found that the man was unable to walk.

The team then administered primary care and first aid to the patient. Thereafter, the team admitted him to a hospital where he had an X-ray scan. The report indicated a broken left knee that needed immediate orthopaedic surgery. Once Raj had undergone surgery, he was discharged from the hospital but still needed post-operative care. Since no beds were available at this hospital, the Emergency Response Unit admitted him to HOPE Hospital, where he recovered gradually with post-operative care and treatment.





By collaborating with local and government stakeholders, HOPE works to bring about positive changes. Exemplifying this, HOPE has been one of the main partners of the West Bengal State Commission for Protection of Child Rights in the Community Radio programme since its inception, providing audio lessons on various subjects and classes taught in Government formal schools to street-connected children. The programme has been well received, and Hope Kolkata Foundation has been acknowledged by the West Bengal State Commission for Protection of Child Rights for its continued support and efforts.

HOPE also recognises the role of caregivers in ensuring quality education and care for all children. Upholding this belief, the Parent Support Groups, initially established for parents of children with special needs, have now become independent. These groups now support new parents in accessing government schemes.

Through these diverse programmes, HOPE aims to create a holistic environment for every child to grow and prosper to the best of their ability.

# Integration of Quality Education to ensure improved learning in primary schools

HOPE implements this school-based education programme in 48 Government Primary Schools of Kolkata and Howrah and 17 Government Resource Centres in Kolkata. This programme's objective is to ensure quality education at the primary level for all children, including children with special needs.

#### **Impact**

- 5,718 children benefitted from joyful activitybased learning.
- 1,585 children were enrolled in schools, and among them, 26 were children with special needs.
- I,201 children received support from Government Resource Centres, and I,030 made progress.
- 440 children with learning gaps made progress.
- 104 school children with special needs made progress.
- 280 teachers used activity-based learning methods for children with learning gaps.

- 3,531 parents attended Parent Teacher Meetings, were informed of their children's progress, and used child-
- 1,626 community people were sensitised through awareness programmes on child-centric parenting practises with a special focus on children with special needs.
- 775 children with special needs were linked with government schemes and/or disability cards essential to access
  these government schemes.



#### Story of Change

Roshan, a Class IV student at a government school, had a significant learning gap. Coming from an economically disadvantaged background and being a first-generation learner, Roshan lacked the necessary support to stay motivated in school.

Based on the result of his ASER test, the HOPE teachers created an individual plan for his development. Interactive and child-friendly teaching and learning materials helped Roshan to understand the concepts. Gradually, Roshan began to enjoy school and classwork. After a year, he showed remarkable interest in learning. Now in Class V, Roshan has achieved the basic proficiency level as per ASER.

## Naboasha



The Naboasha programme is dedicated to street-connected and slum-dwelling children aged between 6 and 18 years. Through educational support and extracurricular classes in a child-friendly environment, the children are encouraged to learn, ensuring their holistic growth and development.

Additionally, Community Support Groups and Child Vigilance Groups maintain a 24/7 safety net for the protection of child rights and to ensure no child falls victim to the violation of child rights. Currently, there are 8 Naboasha Centres across Kolkata.

#### **Impact**

- **597** children received educational support along with supplementary nutrition.
- 425 parents encouraged their children to study and are more involved in their children's education.
- **550** children were promoted to the next class.
- **259** children were linked with different Government schemes.
- 458 children were linked with social entitlements.
- 437 community people were addressed in awareness programmes.

#### Story of Change

Sunanda, a 14-year-old girl, struggled with behavioural issues and low self-esteem. She was also withdrawn from studies because of many family struggles. Due to her behaviour in school, Sunanda faced the risk of suspension. At this point, the Naboasha Centre intervened through counselling, play therapy, dance movement therapy, and cognitive behavioural therapy. With personalised support and emotional regulation techniques, Sunanda gradually opened up. Within Naboasha's nurturing environment, Sunanda began engaging in class; her behaviour improved, and she built peer relationships. Her academic performance and self-confidence improved notably. Now, in Class VIII, Sunanda is also an active and responsible member of the Child Vigilance Group.

# Crèche Facilities for Children Without Parental Supervision

Hope Kolkata Foundation runs 5 crèche centres across Kolkata (Chitpur, Panditya and Kasba) and Howrah (Bhagar). These crèches provide a safe space for children of working parents living in slum areas who often lack parental care for extended periods. The project provides early childhood education and supplementary nutrition to children aged 2-5 years.

Additionally, the crèches encourage parents and caregivers to educate their children. Formal school enrollment is also an integral activity of this project. These measures aim to establish a solid foundation for lifelong learning and well-being.



#### **Impact**

- **263** children were supported throughout the year.
- **88** children were enrolled in formal schools.
- 248 parents have improved knowledge on child education and the importance of financial management.
- I,204 community people were informed on child rights and child development through 32 community awareness programmes.
- **152** parents gained financial literacy and started saving money for their children's future education costs, either in a savings account or Sukanya Samridhi Scheme (for girls).

#### **Story of Change**

Ruhan is a 3-year-old boy from Bhagar. He lives with his single mother, who was unable to look after him properly because she had to take on many jobs to earn a living. As a result, Ruhan was neglected and often went hours without food and care. After the crèche teachers identified Ruhan, they counselled his mother to send him to the crèche.

Once Ruhan joined the crèche, he showed visible signs of improvement. Slowly, with food, nourishment, and care, Ruhan started getting along with others. He now enjoys going to the crèche.

# Brian's Way Resource Centre

The Brian's Way Resource Centres offer various therapies and special education to children with special needs, aiming to improve their quality of life. Currently, there are three resource centres throughout Kolkata and Howrah.

To create a barrier-free centre, a disability-friendly customised bus service and a Toto transport service are provided for the children in two of the centres. Additionally, preliminary counselling guidance is provided to parents and caregivers to support their children at home.



#### **Impact**

- 237 children with special needs benefited through the project.
- 219 children progressed through functional therapies.
- 145 children with special needs progressed in special education.
- 52 children progressed after attending functional skill development sessions.
- 35 children were linked with government entitlements.
- 453 community people were sensitised on disability, social inclusion and government schemes and facilities for children with special needs and their families.
- 8 children with special needs were identified through community awareness and enrolled in Government Primary Schools.
- 30 children with special needs received grocery support.
- 10 children with special needs received grocery and medical support.

#### **Story of Change**

Roop is a 14-year-old boy with cerebral palsy. His family struggled to afford his care and therapies. Upon learning about the resource centre from another parent whose child was enrolled in the centre, they too brought Roop to Brian's Way.

After Roop was enrolled at Brian's Way, he underwent a thorough assessment to determine the therapies that would help him lead an improved quality of life. Accordingly, he started attending physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech and dance movement therapy. He also attended special education classes and functional skill development classes.

Now, Roop has shown remarkable improvement. He can now construct sentences, communicate with others, and walk with far better control. Moreover, he has also learned basic monetary transactions, grocery packing, and t-shirt block printing, skills that are both functional and important.

## **Education on Wheels**

Education on Wheels is a remedial coaching centre exclusively for street-connected and slum-dwelling children (aged 6-14 years) in Chitpur. This programme identifies cases of child labour, out-of-school children or children who have never been enrolled in school and enrols them in their age-appropriate class at government schools for formal education.

After enrollment, the team ensures the students' school retention and holistic education and development. Education on Wheels provides counselling through tools like Mandala art therapy.

To reduce its carbon footprint, the Education on Wheels bus utilises solar energy from solar panels installed on its roof to power the fans and lights inside. These green practices also significantly reduce the bus's operational costs.



#### **Impact**

- 64 children were supported throughout the year. 4 new children were enrolled in the project.
- 60 children showed improvement in learning and were promoted to the next class.
- 60 children enjoyed and celebrated several cultural events to ensure social inclusion and participation.
- 43 children obtained social entitlements.
- **30** children were linked with Government schemes.
- 44 adults/parents were assisted to link with different social entitlements.

#### **Story of Change**

Amit, a 9-year-old boy, grew up in difficult family circumstances. His father was a substance user, and his mother, a daily wage worker, struggled to support the family. Amit grew up isolated and scared amidst this domestic instability. Moreover, he lacked all exposure to education. Identified by the Education on Wheels team, Amit was eventually enrolled in the programme after repeated counselling and discussions with his mother.

Although initially withdrawn, Amit gradually settled in. With sustained counselling and guidance, Amit is now in Class IV and enjoys studying.

## SICW UMEED

Umeed provides special education and therapies to children (2-6 years) with special needs or physical and psychosocial needs from the residential child care unit of Society for Indian Children's Welfare. Classes are conducted by certified special educators and teachers using joyful teaching methods that address the pre-set milestones of each child. Based on their unique needs, each child receives therapy and different aids to improve their quality of life and ensure a more accessible, disability-friendly living.



#### **Impact**

- 35 children benefited through this programme, among whom 14 were children with special needs and 21 with learning difficulties.
- 12 children were adopted as per the government guideline and were rehabilitated to new families.
- 6 children were restored to their own family as per the judicial court order.

#### **Story of Change**

Paul, a 6-year-old boy, was placed at SICW by the Child Welfare Committee. He exhibited mild right-sided facial deviation, unclear speech and had no prior education.

To support Paul's development, doctors and therapists initiated regular speech therapy and counselling. A special educator designed an Individual Education Plan to support him. Through structured interventions, such as rhymes, music, storytelling, group activities, and regular therapy, Paul's communication, academic, and social skills steadily improved. With constant encouragement, he overcame his shyness and began engaging with peers.

Having made significant emotional, social, and cognitive progress, Paul is now ready to join his adoptive family in the U.S., stepping into a new chapter of his life filled with hope and opportunity.

In response to these needs, HOPE significantly strengthened its Child Protection Programme through Residential Child Care Centres and Child Watch, as community-based initiatives to reinforce the child protection system. Additionally, the Mother and Child Care Unit and Aftercare Programme for Young Adults extend the aims of Protection to vulnerable mothers and young adults transitioning to non-institutional care.

Together, these interventions create a safety net that ensures immediate rescue, rehabilitation, and long-term reintegration of vulnerable children. By working closely with families, schools, local stakeholders, and Child Welfare Committees, the programmes promote family and community-based interventions, care, and protection for effective deinstitutionalisation. These measures ensure that every child has the opportunity to grow up in a safe, supportive, and enabling environment.

# HKF, PBKOJP, BPWT

#### **Residential Child Care Centres**

The Residential Child Care Programme provides a safe, nurturing, and rehabilitative environment for children who are survivors of abuse, neglect, trafficking, child labour, forced begging and abandonment. These child care centres, in alignment with the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015, ensure comprehensive care and protection through balanced nutrition, structured daily routines, psychosocial counselling, medical support, life skills, education, and family reintegration.

Over the past several years, the Residential Child Care programme has made a significant impact in transforming the lives of hundreds of vulnerable children. The consistent efforts of the trained child care team have resulted in reduced re-victimisation and enhanced resilience among the children.

Furthermore, HOPE has integrated family-tracing, restoration, and reintegration measures into the Residential Child Care Centre framework. Recognising that residential care is not a permanent solution, the organisation works closely with Child Welfare Committees and other stakeholders to explore safe and suitable family-based alternatives such as kinship care, foster care, or legal adoption. Where reintegration is not possible, long-term residential care continues with a strong focus on education and skill-building to ensure that children are eventually equipped to transition into independent adulthood with dignity and resilience. The Hope Foundation remains committed to upholding every child's right to protection, development, and a life free from exploitation and neglect.



Currently, HOPE supports 6 residential child care centres for girls aged 6-18 and 4 residential child care centres for boys aged 6-18.

#### **Impact**

- **621** children were supported in the Residential Child Care Programme.
- 285 children were newly identified and placed in the Residential Care Centres according to the order of the Child Welfare Committee.
- 19 children engaged in labour and 52 children engaged in begging were rescued and placed in residential care as per the order of the Child Welfare Committee.

- 27 boys with a history of substance abuse and living at train stations were placed in residential care as per the order of the Child Welfare Committee. They completed the detoxification treatment and other helpful resources.
- 39 orphan and abandoned children were placed in Pre-Adoption Foster Care and were adopted, following the legal process. Among these, 5 children were adopted by international couples under inter-country adoption rules.
- **68** orphan and abandoned children (those remaining), of which **22** were girls and **46** were boys, were supported and referred to be declared as legally free for adoption.
- 195 children were restored to their families. Among them, 90 were girls and 105 were boys.
- 141 children received home-based education support after being restored to their families and are continuing their education.
- 13 girls who were victims of sexual abuse and social stigma received restorative care and legal support.
- **53** missing/run away street-connected children were enrolled in school and improved their physical and psychological states.
- **169** children, including children who dropped out of school and those who had never attended school, were enrolled in school after being placed in HOPE residential child care centres.
- 251 children identified with learning difficulties received special education support and improved their learning level status.
- 9 children (8 girls and I boy) passed Secondary Exams (Class X), and I3 children (I2 girls and I boy) passed Higher Secondary Exams (Class XII).
- 234 children were promoted to the next class.
- Children's retention in academics and satisfactory performances have been ensured through regular classes, supplementary tuition and special education classes.
- 136 children above 14 years completed prevocational training courses.
- 380 families were informed on how to improve their socio-economic status, childcare and child rights, and families and children were linked with government schemes and entitlements.
- 472 community people and stakeholders were informed on various child protection and child rights issues through 76 awareness sessions conducted in the community.
- 38 families were linked with the social security schemes to access housing, toilets, free drinking water, and acquired citizenship documents, Government subsidies and allowances, health cards, job cards, etc. and improved their socio-economic status.
- **II3** children were informed and linked with social security schemes that included education scholarships, Aadhar Card, birth certificates, and disability certificates for stipend and reservation facilities.



## **Children's Success and Annual Achievements in Sports:**

The Hope Foundation continues to promote sports as a vital part of holistic child development, ensuring that every child has access not only to safety and education but also to the joy and freedom of play, expression, and growth through physical activities. Moreover, sports provide a platform for inclusion and equality, where children from diverse social, economic, and emotional backgrounds come together on equal footing. The sense of achievement children gain through tournaments and matches, regardless of the outcome, builds confidence and encourages them to dream bigger.

#### **Impact**

- 436 children attended weekly classes in football, karate, taekwondo, cricket, and other sports.
- 8 girls participated in an inter-club football match.
- 6 girls participated in a football tournament held in Behala, organised by Behala Maity Para Naba Tarun Sangha.
- 17 boys participated in a Karate Tournament, and I boy won a gold medal and a bronze, I boy won 2 bronze medals in the International Karate Championship held at Netaji Indore Stadium in Kolkata.
- 8 children (4 boys and 4 girls) participated in the Community Cricket Tournament and Workshop organised by Pro Sport Development (PSD) in partnership with the Upamanyu Mallik Initiatives

(TUMI) in Bhubaneswar, Odisha. **36** teams from different NGOs participated in a capacity-building workshop, aiming to empower young individuals from marginalised communities through cricket, with a focus on health and soft skill development. The children from Hope Kolkata Foundation represented Team India and won the first runner-up position.

• I girl participated in the 9-day 'Tejashwini' Self-Defence Workshop, hosted by the South Suburban Division of Kolkata Police in celebration of International Women's Day. She received a medal and certificate for being

one of the best trainee participants out of 500 participants. Her prior experience as a skilled Taekwondo player, with multiple medals won at state-level championships, significantly contributed to her success.





#### Story of Change

Helpless and scared, Sujoy ran away after experiencing abuse from his stepfather. He was rescued from Sealdah Railway Station and placed in a child care centre. He was then placed in one of HOPE's residential child care centres for adoption as per the order of the Child Welfare Committee.

Sujoy received therapy interventions to help him adjust to the new environment. This was crucial to Sujoy's future rehabilitation and care. He was enrolled in school and also attended tuition classes to bridge the gap in his education. During this time, Sujoy was gradually informed about the adoption process. He was also linked with a Specialised Adoption Agency, and a comprehensive medical report was prepared in accordance with Schedule IV requirements. Eventually, Sujoy was adopted by a loving couple in West Bengal, following all legal procedures.

Post-adoption follow-up reports indicate that Sujoy is adjusting well to his new family. His adoptive parents expressed that he has brought joy to their lives and completes their family. They shared that he is making sincere efforts in academics and is thriving in a safe and nurturing environment.



### After Care Programme for Young Adults

The After-Care Programme is a non-institutional care programme designed to support young adults in their transition from institutional to non-institutional care. The primary objective of the programme is to support and prepare young adults to lead independent lives, with access to higher education, career guidance, skill-building courses, and to ensure their financial independence.

HOPE supports two After Care programmes, one for boys and one for girls.

In 2024-2025, 26 young women and 22 young men received after-care support.

#### **Impact**

- 6 young men and 10 young women are now working full-time jobs and earning a salary.
- 13 young women completed professional skilled training courses in Graphic Design, Phlebotomy, Business Accounting, etc.
- All young adults in the programme are now pursuing higher education. Among them, 13 girls are pursuing a Graduation (Bachelor's Degree) in Honours Subjects, 1 girl is pursuing Post Graduation, and 5 girls are pursuing Management studies. 8 boys are pursuing graduation in specialised subjects.
- 13 young women have been regularly depositing money in their savings accounts, 5 young women acquired a PAN card, and 1 young woman acquired a Voter ID card.
- 5 young men and 3 young women successfully transitioned to independent living after securing stable employment and became self-reliant.

#### **Story of Change**

Rita grew up in a violent family where her father abused her, her mother, and her sister. Eventually, Rita's mother decided to leave her husband and take shelter with her father.

Rita's mother struggled to raise two children on a low income. Hoping for a better future for Rita, she applied to the Child Welfare Committee to enrol her in a child care centre.

After Rita was placed in one of HOPE's residential child care centres, she was enrolled in school. She also started attending co-curricular classes for her holistic growth and development. Rita excelled in dance, painting, and craftwork. After completing her 18th birthday, Rita was placed in Hope Hostel to continue her higher education.

Rita is now a 22-year-old woman who lives with her mother and younger sister. Currently, she's in her third year of university and also works, earning a salary. She now contributes financially to her family, especially in supporting her sister's education.

#### **Mother and Child Care Unit**

The Mother and Child Care Unit is dedicated to vulnerable and homeless mothers who have experienced domestic violence, abandonment, or mental health challenges. These women and their children are placed in the Unit through police intervention and rescue operations carried out by outreach teams, including Child Watch, HIVE India, and other HOPE partners.

The average stay for these mothers is short-term, but may be extended based on individualised rehabilitation plans. During their stay, mothers and their children are given access to a wide range of services, including protection and shelter, nutritious food, healthcare, psychosocial counselling, early childhood education, and recreational activities. Thus, this unit provides a supportive space that addresses both immediate needs and empowers mothers with tools for long-term resilience, independence, and reintegration into society.

Additionally, this unit focuses on mother-child bonding and responsive caregiving. These interventions help children feel secure and supported, allowing them to meet key developmental milestones. Through these interventions, this unit aims to break the cycle of vulnerabilities.

#### **Impact**

- 27 mothers and 25 children were supported at the unit.
- 27 mothers and their II children were reunited with their families in rural and urban West Bengal and other native villages with the support of the police.
- 4 mothers and their 8 children received home-based support for their children after being restored to their families
- 8 mothers with psychosocial illness improved their overall psychological well-being with changes in daily habits and child-rearing activities
- 13 children with low weight improved their weight status and achieved their developmental milestones.
- I newborn child was referred for adoption, as per the legal process and consent of the mother.
- 6 mothers acquired livelihood skills after attending a six-month vocational training course.
- 10 mothers were sensitised on various socio-economic entitlements and schemes and improved their childrearing practices before being restored to their families. Of these, 5 mothers were linked with economic and health schemes.

#### **Story of Change**

Shyambai, a 25-year-old woman, was rescued by Childline and the railway police. She was placed in the Mother and Child Care Unit, along with her 2-year-old daughter, Ekta.

Initially, Shyambai was aggressive and displayed violent tendencies towards others. After receiving appropriate treatment, Shyambai showed significant improvement.

After a few months of counselling, she finally remembered her address. She also informed that her husband is a mason. The project staff contacted the local police station, and after networking with the police, her address was verified.

Meanwhile, Shyambai actively participated in vocational training classes and engaged in in-house activities. Through counselling and communications with the family, Shyambai was reunited with them.

#### **Child Watch**

Child Watch is a community-based outreach programme to support street-connected and slum-dwelling children and their immediate communities. Child Watch recognises the need to maintain a 24/7 safety network to prevent and report various child rights violations. And to achieve this, Child Watch maintains Child Vigilance Groups and Community Watch Groups.

To gain a comprehensive understanding of the programme's effectiveness, a project impact assessment was conducted. The study was designed to assess the programme's outreach, awareness, and behavioural change among children and the community, as well as the overall impact of the interventions on community members, particularly vulnerable children and families.

## The key findings are as follows:

- Parents of street-connected children are aware of the importance of formal education, but due to financial struggles, they cannot prioritise education.
- Older street-connected children do not feel included socially, and they tend to discontinue school.
- Older children are more attracted towards
   addiction and entertainment; they stop studying and opt for a job so that they can have money.
- Older children tend to elope and get married early.
- Street-connected communities are aware of health issues and avail of Government health care facilities.
- Community members are aware of social entitlements.

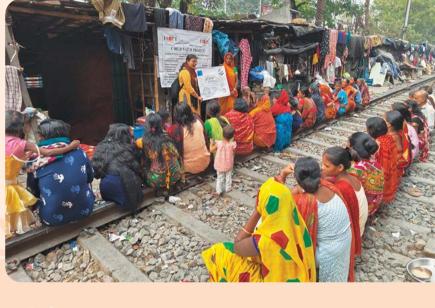
In 2024-2025, the Child Watch project was implemented in 7 street-connected areas of urban Kolkata and initiated a survey to identify new communities to implement similar interventions.

In addition to its regular activities, the team provided 30 tarpaulins, 136 dresses for children, and 171 blankets as needed to street-connected communities.

## Impact

- 784 children and 346 families were supported through this project from seven streetconnected communities in Kolkata.
- II3 children were enrolled in formal school.
- 10 child addiction cases and 7 child labour cases were identified and mainstreamed.
  - l 19 children and l 29 adults were referred to local Government Hospitals for treatment.





## **Story of Change**

I 5-year-old Khushi, one of five siblings, had dropped out of school after Class 4 due to financial hardship. With her family struggling to make ends meet, Khushi was often found begging on the streets instead of attending school. Gradually, she lost all interest in returning to school.

Soon, a member of the Child Vigilance Group identified Khushi as a school dropout and informed the Child Watch Team. The team visited her family, counselled Khushi and her parents on the importance of education. Their guidance motivated Khushi, and she was eager to return to school. With the support of the team and her parents, Khushi was successfully re-enrolled in Class 5.

Today, Khushi attends school and is serious about her studies. She also receives academic support from a local NGO and is no longer seen begging on the streets.







The Livelihood projects aim to bridge this learning gap by extending vocational courses that can help these individuals gain employment opportunities and, thus, financial independence.

Inclusive and accessible, these courses prepare participants for the professional world through a blend of technical and soft skills. Job fairs, company visits, and networking with potential employers provide students with valuable exposure. At the end of the training, students are empowered through formal job placements and self-employment.

Currently, HOPE supports 4 Computer Skill Units, I Beauty and Hairstyling Unit, I Tailoring Unit, and the HOPE Café. Across these different units, the programme is open to those between 14 and 35 years of age.

# **Hope Kolkata Foundation**

## **HOPE Computer Unit**

HOPE's Computer Units offer two courses, each 6 months, for those between 18 and 30 years of age. These 2 courses comprise Computer Application and Financial Accounting, including Tally and GST. Additionally, the unit provides digital literacy classes to children (under 17 years of age) of various Hope Kolkata Foundation projects.

A key feature of this course is its inclusive design, focusing on individuals who have either dropped out of school or college or have the minimum educational qualification. These skill-building opportunities, therefore, help students achieve employment and self-sufficiency.

#### **Impact**

- 608 students were enrolled in the course from the 4 Skill Units.
- 479 students enhanced their skills to acquire jobs, and 249 students got salaried jobs in different companies in Kolkata. The remaining students are pursuing higher education.
- III students completed the digital literacy course.



#### **Story of Change**

Bishnu, 20 years old, lives with his mother and younger sister in a small rented house. After his father passed away, Bishnu started supporting his family by helping in his mother's tea stall and taking on catering jobs. Meanwhile, he also finished school.

Realising the need for technical skills to build a sustainable career, Bishnu enrolled in the Advanced Computer Applications course. Soon, he became proficient in Data Entry, Excel, and Windows OS. Upon completing the course, Bishnu secured a job at Technocon Services as an OMCR Tracking Executive. He now supports his family financially and is continuing his higher studies through an open university.

#### **HOPF Café**

HOPE Café offers a comprehensive 6-month course on Food and Beverage service. There is no educational barrier for this course; trainees have to be at least 17 years of age.

Upon completing this course, students are placed in various cafes and restaurants. Additionally, the customer interactions at HOPE Café and the communication skills acquired during training provide students with firsthand exposure to the professional world.

#### Impact

- 9 trainees received training at the HOPE cafe.
- 8 trainees finished the training in 2024 2025 and were placed in different restaurants and cafés.



### Story of Change

Rupa was placed in a residential child care centre when she was 6 years old. Here, she completed her education, and at the age of 18, she went to HOPE Hostel to pursue higher education.

Once Rupa secured a job, she was reintegrated into her family. However, she wanted a better job, so she enrolled in the Food and Beverage course to acquire new skills. At HOPE Café, she was a diligent trainee. She quickly learned all that was taught to her.

Once Rupa completed the course, she got a job at a well-known café, just like she had hoped. She is now self-reliant.

## **Tailoring Unit**

The Tailoring Unit offers a 6-month course to girls and women aged between 18 and 35 years without any educational bar.

Industrial garment construction, combined with hands-on training on industrial and general machines, equips students with a range of skills. During the course itself, students are encouraged to start working to gain insight into the industry. These experiences also help these students secure formal employment or self-employment at the end of the course.

#### **Impact**

- 80 students completed the course.
- 80 students started earning after completing the course.



#### **Story of Change**

Shweta, 26 years old, was always interested in designing. She was also very excited to do something on her own. Moreover, she also wanted to support her family financially.

Shweta had heard about HOPE's Tailoring Unit from an ex-participant. Excited, she too joined the course. During the training, Shweta learned the essential skills to master tailoring. Gradually, she started taking on minor alteration projects, and soon began making garments on order. Eventually, Shweta secured a job in a fashion house based in Murshidabad, a district in West Bengal.

She is happy and successful, just like she had wanted before joining HOPE's Tailoring Unit.

### **Beauty Unit**



HOPE's Beauty Unit offers professional hairstyling and aesthetician courses to girls and women aged 17 to 40 years. Through this intensive 4-month course, which focuses on hands-on experience, students are encouraged to learn and practise. They are also encouraged to seek professional opportunities during this time to complement their training and enhance their skills.

After completing the course, students are provided with beauty kits to help them launch their careers in the field.

#### **Impact**

- I 53 students completed the course
- 144 students were linked with employment opportunities.

#### **Story of Change**

Tumpa comes from a low-income background, with her father being the only earning member of the family. Tumpa was aware of the financial difficulties of her

family and wanted to help them. Makeup and Beauty were always her passion, so when she came to know about HOPE's Beauty Unit, she quickly enrolled in the course. By the time the course was over, Tumpa had gradually transformed into a skilled artist. Today, she works as a freelancer, earning an income that not only benefits her but also supports her family.





The Sponsorship Programme also operates coaching centres in Bhagar and Chitpur, two of the most densely populated slum areas in Kolkata and Howrah. These coaching centres provide more than just tuition support. Through extracurricular activities, awareness programmes for children and their caregivers, teachers ensure that children do not fall victim to child rights abuses such as child labour or child marriage. Additionally, the team help families access government facilities.

For young adults and those enrolled in college, Sponsorship also encourages financial independence. Vocational training courses, skill-building opportunities, and guidance help many young students pave their way, effectively breaking a cycle of deprivation and other forms of neglect.

## **Impact**

- 2,168 children received support from 1,142 sponsors from across the world, including Ireland, the United Kingdom, India, the USA, Germany, Italy, Spain, and Japan.
- 1,351 children and their families living in Kolkata and surrounding areas, including Sundarbans, were supported through Outreach Education
- 592 children attended Bhagar and Chitpur Coaching Centres.
- 150 children from HOPE residential child care centres received education support and essential resources.



 75 children restored to families from residential child care centres, were supported to ensure their transition from residential to home-based care.

## **Story of Change**

Simran comes from a middle-class family with one earning member. While Simran and her family struggled financially, COVID-19 made matters significantly worse. Unable to sustain her education, Simran contacted HOPE's Sponsorship team. With their help, Simran continued her education with the aim of pursuing a Master's Degree in Journalism and Mass Communication.

Understanding the importance of financial independence, Simran also started working in a small private company while pursuing her studies. She gradually acquired skills highly sought after in the professional environment. Eventually, Simran received and excelled with an all-round holistic development, thanks to the timely help provided by the Sponsorship programme.





## **Impact and Activities**

- **3,359** young people were informed on environmental consciousness and sustainable living through different celebrations and awareness programmes.
- 43 government schools maintained Green Corners, eco-friendly spaces fostered by the schools' Child Cabinet Members. Each plant was named after the child who cared for it.
- 5 schools of Bhagar celebrated Nirmal Vidyalaya Abhiyan (cleanliness drive in schools). 655 students participated.
- 75 children and their parents participated in the Waste Management Workshop conducted in collaboration with the Howrah Municipal Corporation, Government of West Bengal. After the workshop, the community requested that the Corporation clear the accumulating waste in front of one of the creches in Bhagar. HOPE also facilitated this process of advocacy. As a result, the Howrah Municipal Corporation arranged for the cleaning of the dump site once a week.
- World Environment Day was celebrated across all projects.
- 72 children and 15 guardians participated in an exhibition organised by Bhagar Creche on World Environment Day.
- **5** fans and **5** lights (approximately) on the Education on Wheels bus were run on the electricity generated by the solar panels installed on the roof of the bus.
- **595** children of Naboasha and **60** children of Education on Wheels learned to reduce, reuse, and recycle waste material in their art and craft classes.
- 25 children from Child Watch organised a rally to create awareness of a plastic-free environment.
- Children from residential child care centres planted saplings to practise green habits.





# The Indian Internship and Volunteering Programme

HOPE's Internship and Volunteering Programme allows students and professionals to engage with the extended HOPE community through different activities. Together, interns and volunteers come together to build "a world where it should never hurt to be a child," HOPE's mission.

This year 86 interns and volunteers from India contributed 9052 hours in different activities across HOPE initiatives. These participants actively contributed to documentation, making Teaching and Learning materials, and awareness programmes.

# **Hope Kolkata Foundation**

Two German volunteers through Karl Kübel Stiftung volunteered in HOPE's Education programme for 8 months from September 2024 to







March 2025. They were involved in teaching German language classes, developing teaching and learning materials for school children including for children with learning gap and children with special needs. They visited our communities for enrollment camps, participated in awareness programs with Hope Kolkata Foundation staff and implemented methods of activity-based learning among school children.

# The Achiever: Abhishek Singh

Life is full of challenges, but every struggle I have faced has shaped me into the person I am today. My journey—from working small jobs in Kolkata to entering the corporate world, traveling internationally, and then studying in the USA—has been one of perseverance, self-belief, and the relentless pursuit of my dreams.

One of my life-changing opportunities arrived in late 2024 when Prashant Sir from HOPE's Computer Unit introduced me to the Community College Initiative Program (CCIP), which offers international students a chance to study in the USA. I began preparing for the TOEIC exam under the guidance of my mentor, Ramanika Ma'am. In December 2024, I scored 850 out of 900, and got placed among the top 12 candidates from India. However, another challenge emerged during my medical screening, when my Mantoux test returned positive. However, eventually I received medical clearance.



My visa was approved in July 2024, and on August 5, I boarded a flight to the United States, beginning a new and transformative chapter in my life. I arrived in Orlando, Florida, to study Business Administration at Valencia College.

Adapting to the new environment was not easy. Understanding fast-paced lectures posed a challenge, so I began recording classes and reviewing them later. I also noticed stark cultural differences—people in the U.S. planned everything in advance and highly valued punctuality. Slowly, I adjusted, made friends from different countries, and explored American culture.

During my time in the U.S., I visited several iconic places: SeaWorld, Disney Springs, Universal Studios, Busch Gardens, Kennedy Space Centre, Times Square, the Statue of Liberty, and historic sites in Philadelphia. I also participated in the Pathway to Success Program in Cincinnati, where I met 130 international students. This let me expand my global network.

My academic journey continued. By the end of my first semester, I achieved a 4.0 GPA and was named in the Presidential List. In January 2025, I began an internship as a Project Manager at Indienomicon Ltd., where I managed client relationships and solved problems.

As part of the Community College Initiative Program, I also launched a Community Impact Project on waste management. Working with Orange County and Keep Orlando Beautiful, I developed initiatives that I planned to implement in India upon my return by

collaborating with corporations and NGOs.

Looking ahead, I now plan to start my own business in India. I believe my experience in the U.S. have equipped me with vital skills—leadership, time management, problem-solving, and global awareness. I hope to use these skills to create meaningful change in my homeland.

I'd like to end my story with a heartfelt gratitude to those who have supported me. My father, mentor Prashant Sir, guide Ramanika Ma'am, all my managers from Tradebulls, my place of work, and all my program leaders in the U.S.

# **Partnership Spotlight - Specsavers**

The Blindness Eradication Programme was established to provide vital eye care services to street-connected, slum-dwelling and marginalised communities who do not have access to affordable healthcare. It aims to raise awareness of eye health and the importance of regular check-ups. Eye-screening and check-up camps are held in schools and communities, with treatment provided in Hope Hospitalas necessary.

HOPE's relationship with Specsavers was spearheaded by store partner Lisa Walsh. Lisa then travelled to Kolkata in 2017 along with three other Specsavers colleagues to support the eye clinic. On her return, Lisa spoke to the stores about the work she had done, and Specsavers committed to HOPE as a charity partner, initially signing up for a three-year relationship. The Specsavers marketing team also came on board by part-funding the running of the eye clinic.

Specsavers have also fundraised to purchase much-needed optical equipment for the eye clinic and eye surgery department

at HOPE Hospital, which has allowed the programme to expand its services and continue to provide quality eye care and treatment. In 2020, Specsavers further showed its commitment to HOPE and the eye clinic by funding the education and living expenses of students undertaking a two-year Optometry Diploma course.

Specsavers have visited Kolkata to see the impact of the Blindness Eradication Programme and meet with project staff to understand the need and progress of the programme.

We are very proud that our incredible partnership with Specsavers has won The Corporate Charity Partnership of the Year Award at the Charities Institute Ireland "Charity Excellence Awards 2024". This recognition underscores the impact we are making together in the fight against blindness.

Together, we've been able to provide free eye tests, prescription glasses, treatments, and surgeries, transforming lives by restoring sight, independence, and dignity. The impact goes beyond vision; it improves education outcomes, employment opportunities, and overall quality of life.



We are proud to work alongside a partner who not only shares our mission but enhances it through action, compassion, and a deep sense of responsibility toward equity in healthcare. Your contribution reminds us of what's possible when we work together towards a common goal.

## **Story of Change**

Sanoula is a homeless rickshaw puller in Kolkata. As a cataract developed in his right eye, threatening both his vision and his means of income, he became increasingly worried and vulnerable. Alone and without support, he was helpless until he was referred to HOPE Hospital.

At the hospital, a thorough eye examination confirmed that Sanoula required urgent cataract surgery. Pre-operative tests were conducted, and Sanoula underwent the surgery, completely free of cost.

Post-surgery, Hope Hospitalensured his continued care, along with a free pair of glasses. Without this timely intervention, Sanoula would have faced permanent blindness and lost his source of income.

# **Collaboration Projects**



BeesTreesWater, a New York based NGO under Mr. Spicer Khakoo, has been collaborating with Rotary Club of Calcutta Inner City since 2019, to support WaSH programmes and improve sanitation facilities in several slum communities.

This year, the eight community WaSH projects already completed under BeesTreesWater and Rotary during 2020-23 were revisited to assess present requirements in terms of repairs and maintenance. Necessary renovations and replacement of pumps were carried out; cleaning supplies are being handed over to the women in the community, known as Water Sisters, in charge of the facilities, every month for one year from October 2024. Two government schools in Kolkata were also covered by the WaSH programme to improve their sanitation facilities through toilet renovations, new toilets for use by children with special needs, and installation of water filtration systems to ensure access to potable water for the children. Over 5,700 community persons and more than 500 school children have benefitted through these endeavours.

# **EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES in the UK**

It has been a year of incredible support in the UK. The Hope Foundation for Street Children (HOPE UK) is deeply grateful for the generosity shown by our supporters, partners, and donors over the past year.



This year, there were many Team HOPE Challenges. Five amazing supporters ran the **London Landmarks Half Marathon**, raising £5,557. Child sponsor, lan Bush, completed the **London Marathon** and raised £1,000, while Trustee Brendan Mackinney cycled 100 miles in **Ride London-Essex** raising over £3,000.



The most successful **Big Give Challeng**e to date raised an incredible £55,763 for girls' empowerment programmes in Kolkata, thanks to generous supporters in the UK and our champion funder, Coles-Medlock Foundation.



As part of the annual **Footsteps for HOPE** campaign, supporters walked 10,000 steps a day for 30 days, raising £6,157 for education programmes. Child sponsors, **Emily and Greg Elphick**, completed the epic 800km Camino de Santiago in Spain walking for over four weeks. Despite challenging weather, they persevered, and took part in BBC Radio interviews along the way, raising awareness and £2,000 for HOPE.

Yoga for HOPE, celebrated International Yoga Day in June, and was supported by HOPE Patron Simon Low, along with 17 inspiring teachers, including Zephyr Wildman, and over 170 participants signed up to a class.
